From the Pastor

Dear Friends in Christ.



The divine light that drew shepherds and magi to the manger continues to draws us, along with other disciples, to follow Jesus. As his ministry unfolds, they and we encounter God's transformative love, radical hospitality, and fierce devotion to justice.

DEI BY DAY

As Marcus Borg puts it in *The Heart of Christianity*, an insightful book our Church Council has been using for devotional study, Jesus' disciples encounter God's salvation through him. Think of the people Jesus welcomed and touched and taught, those he healed and fed and forgave – in each instance, Jesus' attention was specific to their condition. In the bible, Borg says, there are multiple images of what salvation means:

> Light in our darkness Sight to the blind Enlightenment Liberation for captives Return from exile

Forgiveness and acceptance Food and drink Resurrection from the dead

Being born again **Knowing God** Becoming "in Christ" The healing of infirmities Being made right with God

Eternal life

"Salvation" comes from a Latin word that means "wholeness" or "healing." It has the same root as the word "salve," a healing balm. Rather than being exclusively about heaven after death, salvation in the bible is primarily about God healing and restoring wholeness in this world, Borg explains. Moreover, salvation has both *personal and social* dimensions. It is about life together, peace and justice within community and beyond community. And, Borg says, salvation always involves our response - it involves us in what God is doing in the world.

This month, there are several instances in which to give thanks for salvation in all these dimensions - salvation that has come to us in Jesus Christ and involves us in the saving work God continues to do in the world:

- + Intergenerational Sunday School, Jan 3 Growing deeper in God's love for us and for all creation is part of our calling as disciples, whatever our age.
- + The Baptism of our Lord, Jan 10 Jesus' baptism revealed his identity and purpose to be centered in God, so also our baptism joins us to God's promises of salvation in Jesus and equips us for ministry. Martin Luther taught that the gift of baptism should be a daily reminder: that we belong to Christ now

and forever, that we are anointed with the Holy Spirit, and that we are joined to God's life and mission for the sake of the world.

- + Martin Luther King Jr. Weekend, Jan 17-18 Dr. King's vision for justice and peace continues to inspire our participation in the social dimensions of what salvation means. In addition to an ecumenical service at St. Mark's on that Sunday and the march to the DECC on Monday morning, conversations and a book discussion about racial justice begin this month through an event hosted at Peace UCC and co-sponsored by Gloria Dei (see p. 10)
- + *RIC Sunday, Jan 24* With other "Reconciling in Christ" congregations around the country, we celebrate the grace of God seen in the radical hospitality of Jesus and we seek to reflect it in Gloria Dei's longstanding welcome to lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender persons into full participation in the church. What a privilege for us to receive as our preacher that morning the Rev. Dr. Kevin Maly, who grew up at Gloria Dei and serves as pastor of St. Paul Lutheran Church in Denver, CO. Welcoming Ministries will also host a conversation during our adult forum that day.
- + Annual Meeting, Jan 24 We convene in worship and during a potluck to give thanks for all God has done and continues to do in and through our shared ministry (see p. 15).
- + Healing Service, Jan 31 Conscious of the wholeness God intends for all people, we commend to God all who are in need of healing, through prayer, the laying on of hands, and anointing during worship. Afterward, Chaplain Patti and the Care Team will also remember with thanksgiving all who have died this past year and now rest in God's eternal embrace.

Salvation by grace through faith – that is not only a good Lutheran phrase but also a good comprehensive understanding of the personal and social wholeness God intends, gifting us and involving us in hopeful response for the well-being of the world.

Finally, my family and I wish to thank you for the Christmas cards, gifts, and well wishes during a very worshipful season. We give thanks for Gloria Dei and look forward to our ministry together in the New Year!

(GOOD) SAMARITAN SUNDAY

The first Sunday of every month is Samaritan Sunday at Gloria Dei. Please remember our neighbors in need by bringing non-perishable foods to worship on that Sunday. Although the CHUM Food Shelf welcomes all non-perishable foods, they are usually in need of: peanut butter, canned chicken and tuna, and canned fruit. Other foods that they distribute on a regular basis are: canned peas, canned stew, hash, chili, pork and beans, macaroni and cheese, cream or chicken noodle soup and Spaghettios.

The CHUM Food Shelf provides a five-day food order for people without food or the resources to buy food. Staff, along with approximately 100 volunteers, distribute 260,000 pounds of food annually. An average of 570 households receive emergency food each month; roughly 37% of those fed are children.

Remember that all loose offering on that first Sunday is given to the Gabriel Project at CHUM. This is a program that distributes emergency money to those in need.

Thank you to the Care Team who keep in close contact with our home bound members by calling, visiting and bringing communion to them. During this time of year it is especially important to continue those relationships.

In December, Pastor Carlson led worship at St Ann's on the 6th and the Health Cabinet brought treats to our friends there on the 15th. It is always good to see the folks and enjoy fellowship time with them. On January 6th we will bring worship with communion to our friends at Edgewood Vista at 1pm in their chapel. Please join us; it is a very nice service in a lovely space.

Sr Joan Marie at Essentia Health-St Mary's Medical Center arranged an excellent program on Fall Preventions on December 3rd. A couple of us from Gloria Dei learned excellent and practical tips on ways to prevent falls in the home. Physical Therapist Margo Furcht explained that falls can greatly limit to our quality of life as we age. Both extrinsic factors such as walking surfaces ice, lighting, spilt liquids, etc. and intrinsic factors such as aging, vision changes, pain, etc. contribute to falls.
